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Current State of Retirement Living Options

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Types of Retirement Living in San Diego

- Independent Living generally includes meals, housekeeping, activities and transportation
- Assisted Living generally includes meals, housekeeping, activities, transportation, medication management and assistance with activities of daily living (ADLs): transferring, bathing, grooming, dressing and toileting
- Memory Care supports individuals with Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI) and Dementia in addition to what is provided by Assisted Living





Types of Retirement Living in San Diego

- Assisted Living including Memory Care is licensed as a Residential Care Facility for the Elderly (RCFE) with oversight by the Department of Social Services and governed by Title 22
- Over 600 RCFEs in San Diego County
 - Approximately 20% are communities
 - Approximately 80% are residential care homes also known as board and care homes
 - Memory Care requires additional training. Not all communities and Board and Care Homes offer Memory Care





More about Board and Care Homes

- · Located in a residential neighborhood
- Homelike environment
- Caregiver to resident ratio as high as1:3 during the day and 1:6 at night
- Ability to support specific wants and needs including diet and activities
- Ability to support (with proper training) high care needs including two-person transfer, Hoyer lift, insulin injections, feeding tube
- Appropriate option for residents with high care needs and residents no longer able to take advantage of amenities and activities at a community





What about CCRCs?

- A Continuing Care Retirement Community offers a long-term continuing care contract that provides for housing, residential services, and nursing care, usually in one location, and usually for a resident's lifetime
- Resident must be 60 years or older
- Payment of an entrance fee (buy in) and monthly fees
- Seek financial and legal advice and carefully consider the risks, benefits, and costs of a continuing care contract before signing





Changes over the past 10 years Care Levels


- Increase in the level of care provided by an RCFE specifically at Board and Cares
- With proper training and skilled professionals as needed an RCFE can now support most prohibited conditions including insulin injections, feeding tubes and pressure wounds
- This has limited the need to go to a Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) or what used to be called a Nursing Home





Changes over the past 10 years Pricing In San Diego

- In Home Care median cost is now \$38 an hour up from \$22 an hour ten years ago and projected to be at \$48 an hour by 2033
- Assisted Living median cost is now \$7250 a month up from \$3983 a month ten years ago and projected to be \$9743 a month by 2033
- If you are paying for more than 6.5 hours per day of in-home care, it is more cost effective to go into Assisted Living




Home Health Aide

Narrowing down the options

- Care Needs Activities of Daily Living (<u>ADLs</u>):
 <u>Transferring</u> (1 person, 2 person, Hoyer Lift),
 <u>Bathing</u>, <u>Grooming</u>, <u>Dressing</u>, <u>Toileting</u>;
 Incontinence; Ambulation; Special Diet;
 Cognition; Diabetes; Feeding Tube; Injections;
 Wound Care; Oxygen
- Geography close to spouse, close to adult children, close to doctors, Coastal, Inland, North County, East County, South Bay
- Budget Veteran Association benefits, Long Term Care Insurance, Life Insurance, Own Home, Medi-Cal, Mexico





Challenging conditions

- POA wasn't selected, is deceased or incapacitated
- Family dynamics including guilt, and conflict between spouse and adult child(ren), spouses from a second marriage and their adult stepchildren, and adult siblings
- Crisis that requires placement directly from the hospital
- Long Term Care Insurance (LTCi) isn't fully used
- Specific care needs including insulin injections, feeding tubes, staged wounds, Hoyer Lift, 2person transfer
- Pets in Memory Care
